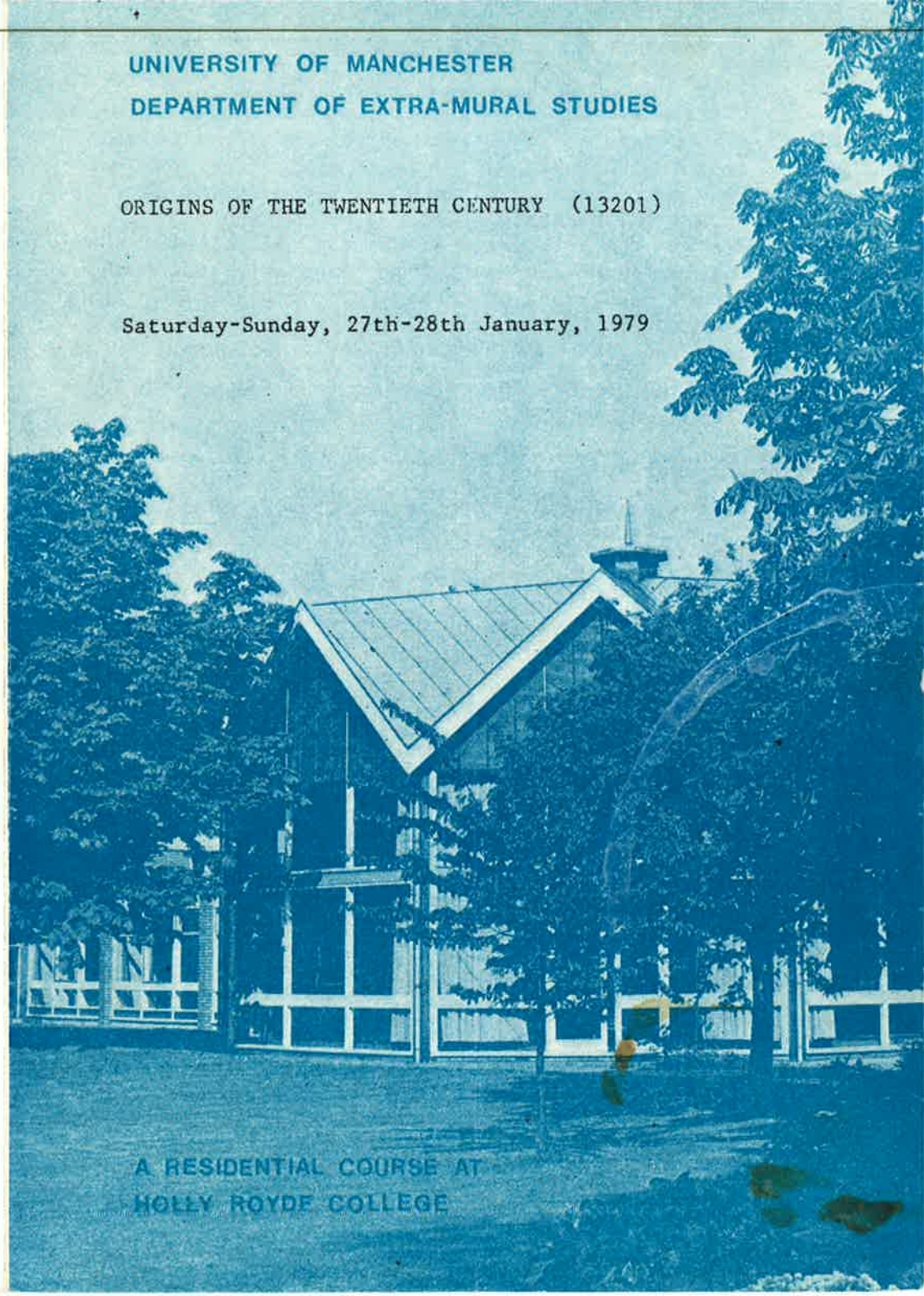
TO REACH THE COLLEGE

Few episodes in the history of human thought can match the cultural and intellectual explosion around the beginning of this century in the Austrian Empire, and in particular in its capital, Vienna. Out of this most conservative of monarchies came ideas which gave new perspectives on man and his place in the world. Philosophy, psychology, literature and the arts were all changed radically by the distinctively modern approach of men such as Freud, Mach, Wittgenstein, Kafka and Schoenberg. The course will portray something of this ferment in its cultural setting and will examine its impact on contemporary thought.
